### 15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

The New Education Policy 2020 has been crafted with an understanding of the intricacies of the modern world. It recognises the significance of multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary approach to higher studies for holistic development of students. The College of Vocational Studies has successfully translated this spirit through effective implementation of the UGCF curriculum across all courses. During the academic year 2022-23, the college offered Value Addition Courses like 'Culture and Communication' and 'Vedic Maths' alongside

Generic Elective courses like 'Business Organisation' and 'Nationalism in India'. These courses were enthusiastically chosen by students across various departments. Students of Humanities chose 'Vedic Maths' and 'Business Organisation' whereas students of Economics and Commerce chose 'Culture and Communication' and 'Nationalism in India'. These courses not only enriched students with skills and perspectives that might not have been accessible within their core departments but also elevated their efficacy and broadened their skill set. Introduction of VAC and SEC subjects has provided students with a wide array of choices, allowing them to tailor their academic experience to better meet their individual needs. Students also have an option to choose GE subjects from another discipline, allowing them to earn a minor degree in that field, thus making college education essentially multidisciplinary. The college actively promotes a multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary approach through its organisation of lectures and talks that serve as prime examples of this pedagogical philosophy. For instance, lectures like `Fragrant Flavours and Forgotten Foods: Story of Delhi through Food' delivered by Padmashree Awardee Prof. Pushpesh Pant at Karvan the annual festival of the History Department exemplified profound significance of an interdisciplinary approach to academics, seamlessly blending elements of history, culture, and gastronomy to illuminate Delhi's culinary heritage. Students at the college actively contribute to society through participation in outreach activities with groups like Green Brigade, which organised seminars on sustainability and waste management, and NSS, which initiated programs like the Electoral Literacy Club on 22/02/2023 and conducted cleanliness drives. In alignment with NEP 2020, the college has created a dynamic learning environment. Looking ahead, the college is committed to expanding its initiatives and resources to further facilitate this progressive approach to education.

### **16.**Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The College of Vocational Studies, a constituent of the University of Delhi, diligently adheres to the university's guidelines. In alignment with the University's adoption of the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, our college has adopted the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) system. This system provides greater choice to students and ensures that no course in which they have invested their time and effort would ever be in vain. It offers enhanced flexibility and mobility in education. To inform our students about the NEP 2020 and the ABC system, the college plans to organise workshops and lectures. These initiatives aim to empower students with knowledge to make most of these educational advancements. The

Academic Bank of Credits further strengthens the foundation for a multidisciplinary approach to higher education. The element of continuous assessment and practical has given teachers and students freedom to explore how classroom knowledge can be applied in the real world. ??For example, the mandatory Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC) in Environmental Studies now incorporates a practical component. This allowed teachers to assign specific tasks to students. Students were instructed by the faculty to visit different colleges within the Delhi University or nature parks and then create reports detailing the biodiversity they observed in these locations. Additionally, the college is dedicated to making infrastructural and administrative improvements to ensure the successful implementation of the ABC system. These efforts collectively contribute to a more dynamic and responsive educational environment at the College of Vocational Studies.

### 17.Skill development:

The component of skill development under the NEP instructs institutions to align their curriculum with the National Skills Qualifications Framework. The NSQR primarily focuses on the dissemination of vocational education. The College of Vocational Studies takes pride in being one of the pioneering institutions that provide high-quality vocational education. The college offers seven specialised vocational courses: Tourism, Small and Medium Enterprises, Office Management and Secretarial Practice, Marketing Management and Retail Business, Human Resource Management, Management and Marketing of Insurance, and Materials Management. Providing unique and effective vocational education to students is deeply embedded in the foundational vision and mission of the institution. The college boasts specially trained faculty members who teach these courses. The institution ensures students receive value-based education through VAC courses like 'Ethics and Culture' and `Ethics and Values in Ancient Indian Traditions'. Societies like NSS and Green Brigade assist in inculcating humanistic values in our students. Additionally, the college organised multiple lectures and field trips during the academic session 2022-23 to enhance skills and expose students to the actual field of work. Some of these events included:

• On October 7, 2022, Team ComSoc successfully organised an industrial visit to the Coca-Cola Happiness Factory situated in Greater Noida, Uttar Pradesh. Thirty-two members, along with two faculty members, visited the factory to acquire knowledge about the company's basic operations, production, and management processes.

- Enactus CVS is also actively involved in establishing selfhelp groups in Najafgarh in collaboration with the Delhi government under the National Urban Livelihood Mission. The goal is to create self-sustaining, large-scale businesses and generate employment opportunities for women. The department's efforts in this area have gained recognition, including coverage in newspapers and appreciation from the current Revenue and Transport Minister of Delhi, Shri Kailash Gehlot.
- On October 20, 2022, Vociferous Vocationals, the Society of Vocational Courses, organised an enlightening seminar on "How to Ace Interviews" featuring Mr. Rajat Mathur, a working professional with over 20 years of corporate and interviewing experience.
- Aspire, the Placement Cell, took the initiative to train students through various offline sessions, including Career Counselling Sessions, Resume Building Workshops, Sessions for GD-PI, ISB YLP Sessions, and Meet the Alumni & A Day with Aspire. These activities helped our students incorporate new learnings and gain confidence during interviews, making a significant contribution to Aspire's growth.

In conclusion, the College of Vocational Studies remains committed to providing outstanding vocational education and skill development opportunities for its students through a variety of enriching experiences and initiatives.

# 18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

The National Education Policy (NEP) places significant emphasis on the effective integration of Indian knowledge systems into all aspects of education. At our college, we actively uphold this commitment by not only offering courses rooted in Indian knowledge systems but also through various initiatives such as seminars, talks, and field visits. For instance, during the academic year 2022-23, the Mathematics department introduced Vedic maths as a VAC option for students, aligning with our focus on Indian knowledge traditions. Similarly, the English department's 'Culture and Communication' paper delved into instilling core values like Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam and Ek Bharat Shreshtha Bharat, drawing inspiration from texts like the Bhagavad Gita and speeches by Sri Aurobindo. The course also included readings from Indian folk cultures. In furtherance of these values, the college recently unveiled a statue of Swami Vivekananda, reinforcing his enduring influence on the ethical framework of the college. Additionally, our History department actively engages students in exploring India's

rich cultural tapestry through visits to events like the Surajkund mela, renowned for showcasing traditional handicrafts, food, and cultural performances from across the country. Furthermore, students benefit from educational walks to historical monuments like Qutb Minar and museum visits to the Pradhan Mantri Sangrahalay, all aimed at fostering a deep appreciation for the diverse culture and heritage of India. In addition to this, the college promotes teaching in Indian languages. All first-year students are required to study Hindi. Furthermore, the college's cultural society includes groups dedicated to celebrating Indian classical dance and Indian folk and street theatre forms. The Department of Hindi celebrated International Matra Bhasha Divas on 21 February, 2023. On this occasion teachers read poetry in their respective mother tongues. The day was celebrated to highlight the importance of preserving regional languages. These wide arrays of initiatives showcase college's dedication towards preserving and promoting India's rich and diverse knowledge systems.

### 19. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

The National Education Policy (NEP) places a strong emphasis on Outcome-Based Education (OBE), and the university, fully recognizing the significance of this approach, has tailored its Undergraduate Curriculum Framework (UGCF) accordingly. One noteworthy feature of our academic setup is the transparency with which the learning outcomes of each course are readily available on the college website. This enables students to gain a clear understanding of what each paper aims to achieve, aligning perfectly with the principles of OBE. In addition to clearly defined learning outcomes, our curriculum, teaching methods, and internal evaluation processes have been meticulously designed to materialise aims of OBE. The college has gone a step further by institutionalising a robust student feedback mechanism that critically assesses whether the desired educational outcomes are being met through our various practices. Faculty members of the institution conduct internal and continuous assessment throughout the semester with focus on expected outcomes of a course. At the beginning of each semester, the teachers also create a comprehensive teaching and lesson plan which provides a well delineated roadmap for achieving desired course outcomes. Furthermore, a vital component in the development of course outcomes is the practical exposure students gain through internships and placement opportunities. In the academic year 2022-23, College of Vocational Studies witnessed a remarkable achievement as the students secured positions across a diverse spectrum of sectors, including IT, media, finance, HR, and many others. Notably, a significant number of our students also opted for further studies,

and the OBE approach played a pivotal role in facilitating their pursuit of desired career paths. In essence, our commitment to Outcome-Based Education can be seen through our efforts that empower our students to succeed in an ever-evolving professional landscape.

### 20.Distance education/online education:

The College of Vocational Studies is equipped with facilities that can facilitate online learning if needed. All classrooms are ICT enabled with projectors, and the old building has Wi-Fi access. The seminar and conference rooms are fitted with projector and sound systems. They are utilised to conduct conferences, seminars, and workshops. Under the National Education Policy 2020 students can take courses on digital and technical literacy. For instance, the commerce department offers VAC courses on 'Digital Empowerment' and the Tourism Department offers a specialised course on 'E-tourism'. Such courses underscore the growing importance of digital platforms and exemplify the institution's efforts in seamlessly integrating them into the fabric of teaching and learning. Furthermore, our library and computer labs offer students the opportunity to practise on desktop computers, allowing them to refine their skills. Currently, students receive login IDs and passwords from the library to access academic papers and online resources through NLIST-INFLIBNET. The NEP emphasises offering education through various methods like online, hybrid, and on-campus options. This is crucial in a diverse country like ours to ensure access to education and academic resources for all students, promoting inclusivity. Additionally, our college serves as a centre for IGNOU (Indira Gandhi National Open University), NCWEB (Non-Collegiate Women's Education Board), and SOL (School of Open Learning). These distance learning formats cater to students with diverse backgrounds and needs, offering flexible education modes. Furthermore, many of our faculty members actively contribute to the development of study materials for SOL, IGNOU, and ePathshala.

1.1.1 - The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

College of Vocational Studies is a constituent college of University of Delhi. It was founded in 1972. CVS is distinct as it emphasises on skill-building by offering a variety of vocational courses to students. CVS follows a pre-determined syllabus set by the University for all the courses offered such as B. Com (Hons.), B.A.(Hons) History, B.A. (Hons)Economics, B.Sc (Hons) Computer Science, B.A.(Hons) Business Economics, B.A.(Hons) English, B.A.(hons) Hindi and Bachelor of Management Studies (BMS). The seven vocational courses are MMI-Management and Marketing of Insurance, MMRB-Marketing Management and Retail Business, Tourism Management, MOM-Modern Office Management, SME- Small and Medium Enterprises, HRM-Human Resource Management and MM- Material Management. The syllabus of Vocational courses isdesigned by the college and approved by the University. Additionally, CVS also offers Post-graduate diploma in Tourism.

The classes, practicals and tutorials are scheduled as per course-

wise time-table prepared by the college Time Table committee and the same is uploaded online on CVS website [www.cvs.edu.in]. This gives students easy access to their time-tables and helps in smooth conduct of classes. Department wise and teachers' time-table are also prepared in the beginning of the academic session. Attached herewith are the timetables (course/department wise or faculty wise) for the years 2022-23. The teaching-plans of the faculty members are uploaded on the college website for 2022-23.

# 1.1.2 - The institution adheres to the academic calendar including for the conduct of Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE)

Being an affiliated college, the college adheres to the academic calendar prepared by the University. This calendar provides the schedule to be followed for classes, conduct of practical examination, wherever applicable, and the conduct of theory examination towards the end of each semester.

In academic Year 2022-23, National Education Policy (NEP) was applicable to the first year students and LOCF to second and third year students. Under NEP, internal evaluation consists of class tests and assignments. Each paper has an internal assessment of 30 marks, out of which 12 marks are for assignments, 12 marks are for internal test and 06 marks are for attendance . Also, each paper has a continuous assessment of 40 marks where student is awarded a maximum of 35 marks on basis of class participation, quizzes, practicals etc and maximum of 5 marks for attending tutorials. Each paper under LOCF has an internal assessment of 25 marks, out of which 10 marks are for assignments, 10 marks are for internal test and 05 marks are for attendance . The students are also evaluated using other methods such as PowerPoint presentations, projects, group discussions etc. The students are given deadlines for assignment submissions while dates for class tests and presentations are announced well in advance.

The college academic calendar also incorporates the conduct of various cultural and extra-curricular activities, conduct of seminars, special lectures, organising of annual day, sports day and celebration of other national festivals.

### 2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

# 2.2.1 - The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organizes special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Assessing learners is an ongoing process that assists educators in recognizing both slow learners and advanced learners within the classroom. Teachers gauge students' progress through lectures and various activities such as quizzes, assignments, tutorials, and more. These assessments enable the identification of students with varying learning paces. Subsequently, tailored teaching strategies are developed and implemented to cater to the specific needs of these students.

Our faculty members adopt an integrated teaching approach:

### Slow Learners:

- Tutorials and remedial classes are undertakenfor students who may need extra support. Additionally, Mentor-Mentee groups are established for all students.
- To enhance the subject knowledge of slower learners, we offer supplementary reading materials, simplified books, including e-links.
- Home assignments are regularly assigned and graded to evaluate teaching effectiveness.
- Peer learning is fostered through group discussions and presentations.

### Advanced Learners:

- Our teachers assess students' potential and identify advanced learners through lectures, tutorials, class assessments, assignments, and extracurricular engagement.
- We recommend advanced readings in relevant topics to enhance.
- The College library provides access to Inflibnet service and other e-resources affiliated with Delhi University.

The evaluation of Internal Assessment in done through: Class Test, Assignments, Power Point Presentations, Project, Case Study, Group Discussions. Whereas assessment pattern of Courses based on Under Graduate Curriculum Framework - 2022 implemented from the Academic Year 2022-2023 is different from previous evaluation process. The assessment pattern for courses of different credit distributions is provided by the University.
